# Why do priests wear a white collar?

The white collar or "Roman collar," dates back to the 15th century when priests placed linen or cotton collars over their outer clothing to be easily distinguished. This evolved into the collar we see on most priests today when wearing their black "clerics."

According to the U.S.
Conference of Catholic Bishops
(USCCB), "Outside liturgical
functions, a black suit and
Pomen coller are the usual

Roman collar are the usual attire for priests." When wearing a white collar, it means he's "on duty" to give blessings, offer counsel, and administer Sacraments.

## Savor a saintly summer

The slower pace of summer offers opportunities to nurture faith in creative ways not feasible in hectic times. Consider these ideas:

Visit a shrine. Holy places where relics are preserved, an apparition has taken place, or one that encourages a particular belief or devotion offer opportunities for prayer and pilgrimage. Look for directories of shrines in the U.S., including www.catholicshrines.net or from the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) http://ow.ly/ OYvJ30bAayl.

Attend daily Mass. Meeting God in the

Eucharist begins a summer day with grace. Daily Mass is a full Catholic immersion in Christ, in the Sacraments, and the saints, all at once.

Gather with other Catholics. As we emerge from pandemic conditions, spending time with other Catholic friends can

provide a community of faith-filled companions. Attend Mass together, socialize together, brainstorm Gospel-centered life solutions

together.

Look for signs of God's love. Find a park or green space near you where you can center your heart and mind on Jesus. Observe His creation and become more aware of His presence.



### Mark 5:21-43, Faith in action.

As the leader of the local synagogue, Jairus was probably pressured by the Pharisees to avoid or reject Jesus. It was a courageous act for him to publicly approach Jesus, bow before him, and beg for a cure for his daughter. Jairus' faith in Jesus was that

On the way to Jairus' home, Jesus was delayed by a woman with a serious hemorrhage. According to Jewish law, her constant

bleeding would have excluded her from most social contact. She thought Jesus wouldn't want to touch her and secretly grabbed His cloak

believing that any contact would cure her. In fact, she was cured, but Jesus told her that it was her faith that provided the cure. We should never allow fear of our unworthiness to keep us from God. By the time Iesus finished with the woman, Jairus was told of his daughter's death. Jesus simply said, "Do not be afraid; just have faith" (Mark 5:36), and Jairus' great faith was rewarded. No matter how desperate your situation may appear, trust Jesus to help. Even death is under His control.

Feasts & . Celebrations

June 11 - Sacred Heart of Jesus. The image of Jesus with His heart exposed in unquenchable flame is a reminder of His intense and eternal love for us.

June 22 - Immaculate Heart of Mary. In response to a request by Our Lady of Fatima, Pope Pius XII consecrated the world to Mary's gentle and devout Immaculate Heart in 1942, and initiated this feast in 1945.

June 21 - St. Aloysius Gonzaga (1591). St. Aloysius prayed vigorously and fasted from age 7. Upon joining the Society of Jesus, he was ordered to cut back on penance in order to

study and spend time with the other students. He died while nursing the

June 24 - Nativity of St. John the Baptist. The only saint whose birth and death we observe,

St. John was Jesus' cousin. He baptized and prepared the people for Jesus' coming. He even baptized Jesus and was later executed for denouncing Herod's marriage to his sister-in-law.

### Is there really such thing as sin?

Dealing with sin is uncomfortable and following God's rules is hard. The world tells us that sin

doesn't exist. While we may think we are "good" and others may look up to us, eventually God will decide if we have been "good." Since His opinion is the one that matters, His rules rule.

Sin is real. The world tells us that sin doesn't exist but Catholics know that "sin is a deliberate thought, word, deed, or omission contrary to the eternal law of God." (Catechism of the Catholic Church) The law can be found in the Ten Commandments, the Beatitudes, and in Scripture. The law says sin is real.

Unconfessed sin separates us from **God.** "For you have hidden your face from us and have delivered us up to our guilt" (Isaiah 64:6). Avoiding guilt means missing God's forgiveness. Each evening, examine the day's actions and ask if they would please God or not. Resolve to do better and take steps to change. Seek absolution through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

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Dear Parishioners,

As we finish the month of June, I formally welcome you back to our Sunday Eucharist and encourage those who are still at home to come back to our Sunday Masses.

The restrictions we have lived with since COVID struck have been incredibly painful.

Last week I was in the rectory kitchen, eating chicken tacos with Father Cesar. And, for some reason, I was barefoot. And as I turned away from the stove, I hit my right toenails. I felt excruciating pain! An in-grown toenail had been bothering me for a while, but, right after dinner, the pain was awful. I have heard friends and family members talk about the pain caused by in-grown toenails. And I thought, "Oh, my goodness, I think this is the kind of pain they were talking about!" It was so intense, and it took over my whole brain. Whatever I was thinking or doing at the time melted away and, in its place, was a blinking red light and a wailing siren that shouted, "Make it stop!"

Nobody likes going through pain. I know I don't.

But pain serves a purpose. Pain *focuses* us in a way that nothing else can. It shakes us loose and propels us out of our comfort zones. It stops our routines and demands our attention.

The past 15 months have been full of pain. Some of the pain has been direct – the pain of illness or of losing a loved one. Or the pain of losing a job or dealing with a major economic setback.

Some of the pain has been indirect – the pain of living, day after day, with a general sense that *things aren't quite right*. Or the pain of losing the things we took for granted. Maybe you've even experienced the pain that comes from living in close quarters with spouses and children you love.

I know you also felt the pain of being away from Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. Thank God, we have been open since last March at 50% capacity, and many of you have been coming to our weekday and Sunday Masses. For some who are still not with us, the pain is acute. For others, it is more subtle. Maybe you didn't even notice it until now, as you read this letter.

Please take a moment right now and think of our quiet church: the altar, the tabernacle, the crucifix, the music, the candles...and the feeling of peace that washes over you when you're deep in prayer. Moreover, take another moment to think about your parish family and all the events we used to enjoy after Mass on Sundays. Do that, and I think you will realize just how much you've been missing our parish community. And how painful this past year has been because you were deprived of the Eucharist at Mass and you were deprived of the love, friendship, and support of your parish family.

Hopefully the pain of this past year has helped focus our attention on what is important in life: Faith, Family, Health, Friendship, Kindness, Community.

We are, God willing, turning the corner on the pandemic. Vaccines are available for those who want and need them. Businesses, schools, and hospitals are settling into routines. It will take time to return to normal, but we know that day is coming.

I want you to know that **our parish will be ready when we open 100%.** We'll be here to welcome you – and all your friends, neighbors, and fellow parishioners – with open arms.

I've spent months reflecting on this pandemic and how it has impacted our Church and community. And, as the pain of these dark months subsides, I find myself focused like never before. I'm grateful and excited for everything that lies ahead of us in 2021-2022. God has done so many good things in the last year. I see His hand at work — especially now!

Here's what I know today:

- 1. We are coming back from this, and our parish will be stronger because of it.
- 2. We are going to celebrate our return to the Eucharist and our parish "re-opening" at 100% in a big way. We could all use a celebration this year, and I personally can't wait. Stay tuned for more details.
- 3. As things return to normal, we will cherish every moment of community and fellowship and take nothing for granted.

I hope you know that I never take <u>you</u> for granted either. Your support of our parish means the world to me, and I appreciate all that you do.

You and your family are in my prayers, and I hope that I am in yours.
