## A Reflection on Offertory Giving

I remember putting 5 pesos into the offering basket, the equivalent of 50 cents in US dollars. I had just turned nine years old. We lived really close to the church, so we always walked to Mass. I was so proud of that contribution and what it meant. For years I had watched my grandmother put money into the collection basket every Sunday. When I put money into the collection basket for the first time, I felt great! I was a part of the parish.

I've continued that practice ever since. Grandma passed away years ago and I became a priest, so the amount of my tithe has changed, but I still get nostalgic when I think of those days. It was a happy time. And it's pleasant to think of my parents and siblings, all dressed up and proper, heading off to Mass ready to return a portion of God's blessings back to Him as the collection basket passed by.

Things are different today. I don't think there many nine-year-olds tithing. People don't give in the same ways either. The economy has changed, and charitable habits have changed with it. Our parish income is more unpredictable these days. We have fewer consistent givers, but we're blessed with more givers who surprise us with large contributions when they have an especially good year.

Thank you for supporting our parish through all the changes life has thrown at us. As we rejoice in celebrating the birth of Christ this season, we are also closing the books on 2021. I invite you to reflect on the year and the ways in which God has blessed you and your family.
