Parish Pastoral Plan -- Last weekend members of the Parish Council gave excellent presentations on the parish vision statement and five goals. Again, for those who were not present in our Masses last weekend, here are the vision statement and the goals.

3. Build a stronger sense of community in the parish among all its constituent groups. (Sacraments, Worship, and Community Events)

4. Foster works of mercy in the community through parish ministries and organizations. (Social Services and Outreach)

5. Promote stewardship of time, talent, and treasure among all members of the parish. (Governance and Finance)

Snow Removal – Last week we had a few days of snow. Thanks to Deacon Arturo Biebrich and Jose Arredondo who helped remove snow from the church and school parking lots. Father Felipe Pulido – On Saturday, January 8, I will be flying from Yakima with my family to Baja, California, for my niece's quincenera. After the celebration we will tour Baja's small towns and cities for a week. Then I will be flying to Chula Vista Nayarit to visit my aunt Consuelo. The third week I will be in Mexico City making my annual visit to our three seminarians at Seminario Hispano. As Director of Vocations in the Diocese of Yakima, I supervise seminarians and I attend their annual evaluations. Every time we have an ordination, the bishop asks me if I find the candidate for Holy Orders worthy, and I testify that I do. Therefore, I need to be informed by the rectors of the seminaries about the progress of seminarians. I review their evaluations, so I will be able to say to the bishop, "This candidate is ready" or "This candidate is not." I will be in Mexico City from January 22 to January 29. Last, I will be present at the first Mass of Father Lalo Chavez in his hometown near Puebla. I will be back home on Friday, February 4, ready for the first weekend Masses in February. I am very fortunate to have Fathers Reilly, Vogl, Keolker, and Izquierdo and all the deacons helping during this time. I will be available to the office staff by phone for any emergency. I won't be able to write the weekly letter during my time away. I will resume writing the letter the second week in February.

Baby Bottle Campaign -- On Saturday, January 8 and Sunday, January 9 we began a baby bottle campaign for Hope Medical of Washington. Hope Medical is a faith-based, non-profit medical clinic that is funded entirely through the generous gifts of donors. Since opening for business four years ago, Hope Medical staff and volunteers have provided free pregnancy tests, ultrasound verifications, guided decision-making, and pregnancy support to hundreds of women. In 2019 alone they performed nearly 300 pregnancy tests and 180 ultrasounds. Did you know that 80% of abortion-minded women who see their babies in ultrasound tests will choose life? I want to thank Jerry Johnson for coordinating this fundraising campaign.

- 1. We celebrated the Solemnities of Mary, the Holy Mother of God on January 1 and the Epiphany of the Lord on January 2.
- 2. We celebrated the memorials of three North American saints Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton, Saint John Neumann and Saint Andre Bessette on January 4, 5, and 6, respectively.

Day of Prayer for Legal Protection of the Unborn – Saturday, January 22, is a day of prayer for the legal protection of unborn children. The United States Catholic Conference of Bishops recommends a novena for life beginning January 19 and ending January 27. You can find the materials for the novena at the USCCB website. In addition, I take this opportunity to call our community to observe Saturday, January 22, as a day for the penitential practices of prayer, fasting, and alms-giving. We pray for full restoration of the legal guarantee of the right to life and do penance for violations to the dignity of the human person committed through acts of abortion.
