## Week Ahead

It is Still Christmas! I simply adore the Christmas season. As a kid, it was different. After Christmas Day, I would have a crushing sense of loneliness and despair. After all, I had to wait 364 days to celebrate Jesus's birthday again! All that changed when I learned how long the Christmas season extends. The Christmas season runs from Christmas Eve through the day before the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which is the Sunday after the Epiphany. We wait to celebrate Christmas longer than a lot of folks, and we continue to celebrate longer. That sustained period of thanksgiving and joy fixes our hearts on the true "reason for the season." Today, consider how you might keep this spirit alive in your own homes. At church, we will celebrate with great devotion the four feast days at the end of December that teach us so much about what it means to believe in the Christ Child: St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr; St. John the Evangelist; the Holy Innocents; the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph.

Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God— We close out the Christmas octave—the eight days following the birth of Christ—with a day honoring Mary as Mother of God on January 1. I am grateful to those who have worked so hard to ensure the success of this celebration. Special thanks to our nine o clock choir members and cantors who have worked very hard during this season of Christmas to provide music for all the extra Masses. On the Solemnity of Mary as Mother of God, our Church gives us a reading from the book of Numbers 6:22-27, which contains my favorite blessing. As we look forward to New Year, 2023, with its additional celebration of the World Day of Peace, I send you a special blessing with this prayer: "The Lord bless you and keep you! The Lord let His face shine upon you and be gracious to you! The Lord look upon you kindly and give you peace!"
