**"To the Nations" or "To the world?"** Does the world ever get you down? Given our sinful nature, the world is not perfect. But sometimes, our feelings about "the world" can make us slip into despair. We lament the state of "the culture" (I always wonder, "Whose culture?") or "society." There can be a tendency to feel hopeless. That sometimes leads to the desire to defend ourselves and our Church from the outside world. <u>But that's not who Jesus calls us to be</u>. The heart of our missionary call lies in the last few verses of Matthew 28: *When they saw Him, they worshiped, but they doubted. Then Jesus approached and said to them, "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age."* 

The Greek word for "nations" used here is "ethnos," meaning "tribes, peoples, nations." Jesus does not speak so much in terms of the world here as He does individuals and groups of individuals. And the Apostles take this command to heart. After Pentecost, they convert Jews, Samaritans, and many diverse peoples in and outside of the Roman Empire. What can we learn from this? While we can't change "the culture," we can, under God's guidance, reach "the nations." Help one family. Encourage one individual to seek Baptism. Knock on the doors in one's neighborhood. This is how the world changes. We do little things, and God moves in big ways. <u>Make this your New Year's</u> resolution for 2023: focus on people, not "the world."
