Dear Fr. Jose

Our fiscal year goes from September 1 to October 31. So, this report is from September 1, 2022, to October 31, 2023.

During that time, we helped 694 households with \$17,490 worth of gas gift cards, food gift cards, utility payments and more. The need was great because of the aftereffects of Covid such as inflation and rent increases. This amount was above our average of \$13,500. We benefited from some extraordinary donations from parishioners and from some other programs that were in place.

As a policy, St. Vincent de Paul does not save money; what we take in must be used as soon as reasonably possible. This can make helping folks difficult when donations are low as we must scale back or, in the worst case, stop helping until we get more funding.

Our greatest need currently is to get new members. Most of our current members are retired and are getting to the point that the ability to take an active part is challenging. We need people to make home visits and/or to answer and direct calls from our help line and/or to help with administration. And it is always good when new members are bi-lingual.

We are very appreciative of the cooperation and help we get from the parish staff.

And we thank you, Fr. Jose, for your support for our ministry.

We would appreciate you forwarding a copy of this letter to our bishop.

2025 Quinceañera Program

A Quinceañera is a joyous celebration of a young woman — a Quinceañera— reaching the age of 15.

The celebration is a way of acknowledging that the young woman has reached maturity and is ready to take on additional responsibilities. Most importantly, the celebration reaffirms her religious faith and the traditional virtues of the Catholic family.

In order to celebrate a Quinceañera at St. Joseph Church, the following requirements must be met:

- The Quinceañera's parents must be <u>previously registered</u> (provide your envelope # at moment of making registration) in the parish and be actively attending Sunday Mass.
- The Quinceañera must have <u>previously received</u> the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist). Please present a copy of the Quinceañera's First Communion certificate at the moment of registration.
- Please register her for the Confirmation program at the Parish Office with Doris or Maria if she has not received Confirmation.
- As part of the formation process, the Quinceañera will need to attend <u>youth group</u> on a weekly basis (Aug. 2024– June 2025) and six supplementary classes.
- The Quinceañera is required to attend a weekend youth retreat (Pre Easter Youth Retreat 2025).
- Parent and Quinceañera service hours: The Quinceañera must complete 20 service hours and the parents must complete 10.

Registration and reservations will only take place on August 1-30, 2024 at the Parish Office. Reservations will be on a first-come, first-served basis.

All Masses for Quinceañeras are all held on the fourth Saturday. Please note we do not schedule blessings at a different time.

Father Jacob Davis: Twenty-Five Years of Priestly Service and 'Miracle:

After 25 years as a priest, Father Jacob Davis certainly believes in miracles. However, a few weeks ago, as he looked out the window and saw the parish garbage can moving by itself across the courtyard of Resurrection Church in Zillah, he didn't know quite what to think. There was no one visible near the can. Just a receptacle moving merrily along on its wheeled cart across the lot. Turns out, there was a toddler behind the can, obscured from view, having great fun pushing it around!

As he prepares to celebrate his 25th anniversary of ordination on June 28, however, Father Davis says he is focusing his attention on the true miracles of the Catholic Faith.

"Lately, I've been meditating a lot on the Sacred Heart and the priesthood, administering the Sacred Heart to the people," he said. Noting that he's "always enjoyed teaching," he spoke of the power of "consecrating (parishioners) in the truth" through Gospel messages. "The truth, as they say, will set you free and deepen your Faith."

Father Davis was ordained in 1999 at Holy Family Cathedral in Orange County, California. Born in 1970 in Richland, Washington, one of six children, the son of William and Margaret Davis graduated from Christ the King elementary school.

He went on to graduate from Richland High School and receive an Associate of Arts degree from Columbia Basin College (CBC).

"I had started thinking

about the priesthood in high school, my sophomore or junior year," he recalled. "I made the decision to go to CBC and discern the vocation."

With his decision made, he entered St. Michael's Abbey seminary in Orange County in 1990, through encouragement from a friend of his family who was a priest at the Abbey. After nine years of study, which included four years in Rome, he was ordained. Before coming to the Yakima Diocese, Father taught at Mary Star of the Sea High School in San Pedro, California and studied for a time in Puebla, Mexico. He then served as associate pastor of Holy Innocents Parish in Long Beach, California, and St. Peter and St. Paul Parish in Wilmington, California.

Since coming to the Yakima Diocese in 2010, Father Davis has served as



hoping you will mark your calendars for this coming October 12, 2024 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Holy Family Parish in Yakima. The focus for our annual Church Mission Congress will be vocations. We have been blessed to have missionaries from other parts of the country and other parts of the world who have become priests for the Diocese of Yakima. But we also need to be very intentional about how we cultivate and encourage local vocations to the priesthood.

Father Edgar Quiroga will be leading our effort at the Church Mission Congress. We will be teaming up with Rhonda Gruenewald, who heads the national "Vocation Ministry: Creating a Culture of Vocations." Key to this is creating a local vocations committee in each of our parishes across the Diocese of Yakima. That will be the work our priests will be doing at the end of September during our Priests Convocation, as well as all those able to participate during the October 12 Church Mission Congress. Father Lalo Chávez and Father Michael Kelly, who head our outreach to young men discerning priesthood, need to "dock onto" local parish committees in order to foster vocations to the priesthood in your parishes. Father Edgar Quiroga will be helping the parishes build that committee dock. He will be working with our clergy as well.

There will be a specific "Called by Name" Sunday where you – the parishioners – will be asked to nominate young men whom you think would be good priests. Bishop Joseph Vázquez from the Diocese of Austin has already worked with Rhonda Gruenewald and her team. He now has 40 men in formation. We are a

smaller diocese, but I do want us to be very intentional in developing vocations to the priesthood from our parishes here in the Diocese of Yakima as well as welcoming missionaries, especially from Mexico, who already have family ties here. It takes all of us together to foster a culture of vocation in our parishes and among our families.

I am grateful to Catholic Extension for their support of our seminarians. I am grateful to YLI as well as the Knights of Columbus and Catholic Daughters of America for their support of our men in formation. I am grateful to all of you for your support of the Annual Catholic Appeal. The single biggest program budget item is support of our seminarians in formation. Your financial support is key. But as you will learn this October, your prayer and your participation in our vocation efforts are even more important.

So as we welcome Father John Washington and Father Antonio Garcia into the body of Catholic priests for the Diocese of Yakima, let us also keep a second eye on who could be coming in behind them as the next generation of seminarians who will become priests for us.

Ricardo Garcia of Wapato Dies

Ricardo Romano Garcia, 85, of St.

Peter Claver Parish in Wapato died March
30 after a hospitalization with Covid. In
addition to his devoted parish service, he
was a board member for the Washington
State Catholic Conference; served on the
Diocesan Finance Council along with his
wife, Monica; and was co-founder and
long-time executive director of Radio
KDNA, the Spanish-language station in
Granger known as "la voz del campesino"
– the "voice of the farmworker."

Garcia was born in 1938 in San Diego, Texas, to Moises Garcia and Antonia Romano. After graduating from San Diego High School, he joined the U.S. Army and was stationed at Fort Ord, California; Lewis-McChord Air Force Base; and then the Yakima Training Center. He met his wife at a dance in Toppenish and the couple were married in 1962, enjoying 60 years of married life before her death.

After receiving a degree in Sociology from Central Washington University, Garcia advocated for farmworker civil rights and benefits in the Yakima Valley. In 1979, he helped co-found Radio KDNA. He also served on the board of Yakima Valley College and El Centro de la Raza in Seattle. He received the William O.

flee for safety, leaving elderly people alone in areas "where abandonment and death seem to reign supreme."

In a statement released with the pope's message, Cardinal Kevin J. Farrell, prefect of the Dicastery for Laity, the Family and Life, which organizes the world day, lamented the "bitter companion" that is loneliness in the lives of elderly people.

"Attending to our grandparents and the elderly," he said, "is not only a sign of gratitude and affection, but a necessity in the construction of a more human and fraternal society." The cardinal's message was also accompanied by pastoral guidelines and liturgical resources for parishes and dioceses. The guidelines suggest that Catholics visit the elderly people within their own community, share with them the Pope's message and pray together.

The document said that to involve the elderly in the day, "older people can be asked to offer special prayers for young people and for peace."

"The ministry of intercession is a real vocation of the elderly," it said.



2024 celebration marks the dition of World Day for trents and the elderly. In 2021, uncis instituted the world day

to be observed each year on the fourth Sunday of July, close to the liturgical memorial of Saints Joachim and Anne, the grandparents of Jesus.

In his message for this year's celebration,

the pope emphasized that "God never abandons his children," even as they grow weak and "can risk appearing useless." But today, a "conspiracy surrounding the life of the elderly" often results in their abandonment by those close to them.

"The loneliness and abandonment of the elderly is not by chance or inevitable, but the fruit of decisions – political, economic, social and personal decisions – that fail to acknowledge the infinite dignity of each person," he wrote.

The Pope explained that such a phenomenon occurs "once we lose sight of the value of each individual and people are then judged in terms of their cost, which is in some cases considered too high to pay." Unfortunately, he said, the elderly themselves can succumb to this cost-benefit mindset; "they are made to consider themselves a burden and to feel that they should be the first to step aside."

Pope Francis identified the decline of communal structures in society and the widespread celebration of individualism as other factors behind the isolation of

the elderly, "yet once we grow old and our powers begin to decline, the illusion of individualism, that we need no one and can live without social bonds, is revealed for what it is."

The Pope then recounted the

Bible story in which the elderly Naomi encourages her two daughters-in-law to return to their hometowns after the death of her husband and children since she sees herself as a burden to them. "Her words reflect the rigid social and religious conventions of her day, which apparently seal her own fate," the pope wrote.

While Orpah returns home, grateful for the encouragement, Ruth "is not afraid to challenge customs and inbred patterns of thought" and "courageously remains at her side," he wrote.

The Pope encouraged all people to "express our gratitude to all those people who, often at great sacrifice, follow in practice the example of Ruth, as they care for an older person or simply demonstrate daily closeness to relatives or acquaintances who no longer have anyone else."

Pope Francis also pointed out how in poorer countries elderly people are often left alone because their children are forced to emigrate, and in regions ravaged by conflict young men are called into conflict while women and children


