CARTA DEL PARROCO PARA TODOS LA COMUNIDAD CATOLICA DE SAN JOSE EN KENNEWICK

Esta carta es para informarle de un cambio que haremos en la celebración de la Santa Misa a partir del 15 de agosto de 2024. Ese día celebramos con gozo la Asunción de la Santísima Virgen Maria. Celebramos ese día que por el poder de Dios y una gracia especial otorgada a la Santísima Virgen Maria, fue llevada al cielo en cuerpo y alma. Con mucha alegría les anuncio que a partir del 15 de agosto de este año estaremos distribuyendo la Sagrada Comunión bajo las dos especies de Cuerpo y Sangre de Cristo de la copa, y así será todos los domingos a partir de esa fecha.

Aprovecho esta oportunidad para comunicarle sobre otro asunto muy serio y muy delicado sobre la Sagrada Comunión. Por algunos parroquianos me he dado cuenta de que algunos fieles que comulgan no reciben la Comunión con más devoción y con más fe. También me han informado de algo que no se nos permite hacer cuando recibimos la Sagrada Comunión. Más de una persona ha intentado llevarse la Sagrada Hostia cuando la recibe en la mano. ¿Cuál es la razón o las razones por las que hacen esto? No lo sé. Quiero comunicarle con todo el amor que esto no está permitido bajo las normas que nos da la Iglesia referente a la recepción de la Sagrada Comunión. La recepción de la Sagrada Comunión a los fieles no es algo privado, o sea en otro lugar de donde se recibe, sino algo que todos juntos recibimos en comunión con la Iglesia, y la Iglesia somos todos los reunidos en un mismo lugar para la celebración de la Santa Misa.

La Constitución Apostólica del Misal Romano habla sobre como los fieles deben recibir la Sagrada Comunión cuando se acercan a comulgar. La Constitución Apostólica del Misal Romano claramente indica que, "si la Comunión se efectúa solo bajo la especie de pan, el sacerdote, teniendo la hostia un poco elevada, se la muestra a cada uno diciéndole: *El Cuerpo de Cristo*. El que va a comulgar responde: *Amen* y recibe el sacramento en la boca, o en los lugares donde está concedido, en la mano, según su elección. El que comulga, *inmediatamente* después de recibir la hostia la consume *integramente*." En otras palabras, cuando recibimos la Sagrada Comunión, la Constitución del Misal nos indica que debemos consumir la Comunión en ese mismo momento y en su totalidad sin llevársela o alguna partícula a otro lugar para consumirla. En algunas ocasiones he visto o me han dado a saber algunos parroquianos que más de una persona intentan llevarse la Sagrada Hostia sin consumirla frente al sacerdote, el diacono o el ministro de la Eucaristía. Eso no está permitido por la Iglesia.

Como sacerdote siento mucho dolor cuando algunos fieles no reciben la Sagrada Comunión con más amor y más devoción. Reciben la Comunión como una rutina cualquiera sin tomar en cuenta que ahí está Jesus real y verdadero con toda su divinidad. En la celebración de la Santa Misa Dios nos alimenta de dos maneras: nos alimenta con Su Palabra y con la Eucaristía. Yo como sacerdote le doy gracias a Dios por todas las bendiciones que nos da todos los días. En especial le doy gracias por la más grande bendición que nos ha dado al darnos Su presencia en la Eucaristía. Lo exhorto a que me ayude a amar y a cuidar lo que Jesus con tanto amor nos ha confiado en la Eucaristía. El poder del Espíritu Santo y la presencia real de Jesus en la Eucaristía es lo que mantiene viva a la Iglesia.

LETTER FROM THE PASTOR FOR ALL THE COMMUNITY OF SAINT JOSEPH IN KENNEWICK

This letter is to inform you of a change we will be making in the celebration of the Holy Mass beginning August 15, 2024. On that day we joyfully celebrate the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. We celebrate that day that by the power of God and a special grace granted to the Blessed Virgin Mary, she was taken to heaven in body and soul. With great joy I announce that starting August 15 of this year we will be distributing Holy Communion under both species of the Body and Blood of Christ, that is, all the faithful will start receiving the Blood Christ from the cup, and this will be the case every Sunday from that date on.

I take this opportunity to communicate to you about another very serious and very delicate matter regarding Holy Communion. From some parishioners I have realized that some faithful who take Holy Communion do not receive Communion with more devotion and with more faith. I have also been informed of something we are not allowed to do when receiving Holy Communion. More than one person has tried to take the Holy Host when they receive it in their hand. What is the reason or reasons why they do this? I do not know. I want to communicate to you with all the love that this is not allowed under the norms that the Church gives us regarding the reception of Holy Communion. The reception of Holy Communion to the faithful is not something private, that is, in another place from where it is received, but something that we all receive together in communion with the Church, and the Church is all of us gathered in the same place for the celebration of the Holy Mass.

The Apostolic Constitution of the Roman Missal talks about how the faithful must receive Holy Communion when they come to take communion. The Apostolic Constitution of the Roman Missal clearly indicates that, "if Communion is given only under the species of bread, the Priest raises the host slightly and shows it to each, saying: *The Body of Christ*. The communicant replies, *Amen*, and receives the Sacrament either on the tongue or, on where this is allowed, in the hand, the choice lying with the communicant. As soon as the communicant receives the host, he or she consumes the whole of it." In other words, when we receive Holy Communion, the Constitution of the Missal tells us that we must consume Holy Communion at that very moment and in its entirety without taking it or any particle to another place to consume it. On some occasions I have seen or have been informed by parishioners, that more than one person attempts to take the Holy Host without consuming it in front of the priest, deacon or minister of the Eucharist. The Church does not allow that.

As a priest, I feel a lot of sadness when some faithful do not receive Holy Communion with more love and devotion. They receive Communion as any routine without taking into account that there is Jesus present in the Host. In the celebration of the Holy Mass God feeds us in two ways: he feeds us with His Word and with the Eucharist. As a priest, I thank God for all the blessings he gives us every day. I especially thank Him for the greatest blessing He has given us by giving us His presence in the Eucharist. I urge you to help me love and care for what Jesus has so lovingly entrusted to us in the Eucharist. The power of the Holy Spirit and the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist is what keeps the Church alive.


Introducing our New School Principal Dr. Melissa B. Slater

St. Kateri Tekakwitha

A smallpox epidemic in her Native American village left Kateri orphaned, disfigured, and half-blind at the age of four, and raised by relatives. Introduced to Catholicism by visiting priests, she was baptized when she was 19 against the objections of her relatives. Eventually, the persecution against her became so strong she had to steal away to a Christian village where she lived in holiness. After her death, her scarred face was miraculously restored to its

A relationship between two people is most satisfying when it is dynamic and growing but that takes effort and care. Our relationship with God is no different. Spending time with God and making Him a daily part of your life will help your relationship with Him grow and deepen.

Got faith?

Faith is not about what you see with your eyes. Faith is about what you see with your heart. "Unless you people see signs and wonders, you will not believe" (John 4:48).

Our God of second chances

The bad news is that at some point in our lives-probably way more than we would like to admit-we are going to make choices that hurt our relationship with God.

The good news is that our God is a God of forgiveness and second chances. Here are some suggestions for using God's second chances in your own

Come to your senses. The Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-52) left the embrace of his father and ruined himself with bad choices. He finally "came to his senses" and returned home. Realize and admit your own mistakes and come back to your Father's embrace.

Avoid bad company. "Walk with


wise men and you will become wise, but the companion of fools will fare badly" (Proverbs 13:20). Surround yourself with people who will support your Gospel values.

Stay close. Closeness to God comes through prayer, Scripture study, regular Mass participation and living a Gospel-centered life.

Don't give up. Jesus spent three years teaching twelve people how to live as His followers. They didn't

always get it right (and they lived with Him!), but they kept trying. When you mess up, remember what Jesus said to the woman caught in the act of adultery. "Neither do I condemn

you ... from now on do not sin anymore" (John 8:11). Pick yourself up and start again.



Why do Catholics wear scapulars?

Catholics wear scapulars as a sign of their devotion to Mary and their commitment to a Christian life. The scapular, particularly the Brown Scapular of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, symbolizes Mary's protection and promises spiritual benefits to



the wearer. Tradition holds that those who wear it faithfully will receive Mary's special protection and will not suffer eternal damnation. It serves as a daily reminder to live virtuously and is often associated with spiritual affiliation to religious orders like the Carmelites.

A vacation is no vacation without Mass

Does your summer vacation sometimes include taking a vacation from Mass? Finding a Mass when you are away from home, or fitting it into a summer schedule can mean making special efforts. Here are four reasons to fit Mass into your summer routine:

Wherever Mass is said anywhere in the world, millions of people you don't know are praying for you and with you. Where else can you get that kind of help?

Attending Mass connects you to the Communion of Saints = the saints in heaven, the souls in purgatory and believers on earth. That's powerful company.

After Jesus ascended to Heaven, His followers formed the early Church to keep His message alive. Every time you attend Mass, you help to keep Jesus' message alive.


The apostle Andrew went a step further than Philip; he found the boy with five loaves of barley bread and two fish. The boy, in turn, offered to Jesus what little he

with many problems at once, it can be overwhelming. It's easy to react like

Philip and give up hope. While on our own, we may not have much to offer, if we offer what we have to God, He can do something amazing with it.





July 3 - St. Thomas, Apostle (First Century): Despite being known as "doubting Thomas," he made a beautiful profession of faith when he received proof of Jesus' Resurrection: "My Lord and My God" (John 20:28). Tradition says Thomas evangelized the Parthians, Medes, and Persians, and ultimately reached India.

July 5 - St. Elizabeth of Portugal (1336): The daughter of King Peter III of Aragon, she married King Denis of Portugal. She became known as "the Peacemaker" for resolving political

conflicts. After her husband's death, she became a Franciscan tertiary with the Poor Clares.

July 15 - St. Bonaventure (1274): Cured of an illness through the prayers of St. Francis of Assisi, St. Bonaventure became a Franciscan. As Minister General of the order, he cultivated a love of the way of St. Francis and the order's ideals.

July 24 - St. Sharbel Makhlūf (1898): A Maronite hermit, St. Charbel lived a life of solitude and holiness. He had a reputation

as a wonder worker, even among his Muslim neighbors.





Why are & Catholics asked A to dress modestly?

Catholics are encouraged to dress modestly, firstly in church, to honor and respect the sanctity of the liturgy. This practice keeps the focus on prayer and the Eucharist, free from distractions. And, dressing modestly is a way to show respect and honor to God.

Beyond church, modest dressing aligns with Catholic values of chastity and humility, guiding us to live our faith daily and publicly. It demonstrates self-respect and respect for others, acknowledging every person's dignity. Modest attire minimizes temptations and scandals, fostering purity in interactions. Moreover, it sets a positive example for others, especially the youth, reinforcing values of decency and virtue.

In essence, modest dress in church and everyday life cultivates an atmosphere of respect, reverence, and virtue, embodying and demonstrating our Catholic beliefs and values.





Yet, Jesus walks the wrong way with them. He asks them questions. He does not start with answers. Even more, Saint John Paul II notes that He "...listens patiently to their version of events, and in this way helps them *recognize* what they were experiencing." *Teach*

It is after Jesus has listened that He begins to teach them to interpret all the events. Then Saint John Paul II continues: "As they listen to Him speak, their hearts burn within them and their minds are opened; they then recognize Him in the breaking of the bread. They themselves *choose* to resume their journey at once in the opposite direction."

Send

This is the "send" part. The disciples are not pushed. They chose to turn back toward Jerusalem. The breaking of the bread "sends" them. The very word "Mass" is related to the word "mission."

This coming September, at our annual Yakima Priest Convocation, and in October at our annual Church Mission Congress, both clergy and laity will be undergoing a rigorous process of getting training on encouraging youth to consider vocations to the priesthood and religious life. Last October, we were to have focused on youth ministry but at the last minute our speaker could not attend and so we had to cancel the Church Mission Congress.

In September and October of 2025, we will continue our deep focus on youth at both the Priest Convocation and the Church Mission Congress, with the help of the National Federation of Catholic Youth Ministry on a plan tied to the new USCCB youth ministry document.

We will be working to find ways for building up the capacity for youth ministry in every parish. We certainly will incorporate the insights of our youth ministers in the Diocese of Yakima. But most of our parishes have no youth minister. So, we also will rely on the

many movements here in the Diocese that work with youth.

Foremost among this is our Arco Iris movement. I am very grateful to Father Tomás Vidal who is not only pastor of our very active parishes in Granger and Mabton but is also spiritual director for the Arco Iris movement. Modeled on the footprint of the Cursillo movement, Arco Iris refers to the famous Cursillo song "De Colores." But in place of a men's retreat and a women's retreat, the dynamic is that the youth provide a retreat for parents and the parents do a couple of retreats each year for youth. The movement follows the framework of "accompaniment" – a key word from Pope Francis. It is a ministry "with" youth and "with" parents.

I am certain other best practices will emerge from our parishes and from our lay movements as we embrace the framework for youth ministry laid out recently at the USCCB meeting. My dream is that as we renovate the Saint Paul Cathedral school building into a community center, we will have a headquarters for providing training and formation so necessary for all of us to accompany youth and build up the young Church in Christ.

My thanks to all of you for keeping up with your Annual Catholic Appeal pledges, which help us provide these key opportunities for our parishes, and my thanks to the Cathedral parishioners as they launch a capital campaign for the renovation of the old school and deepen their partnership with us in providing a place of welcome and accompaniment for youth and their families.

"Listen." "Teach." "Send." May these become our watch words as we find ways to grow the Church by keeping our youth active, especially after their Confirmation!

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How Many of The 'Saints of Summer' Can You Name?

The following saints have feast days which fall during the Summer months. Some may immediately sound familiar, while others may be new to you. See how many you can name. Answers follow at the

- 1. July 3. One of the 12 Apostles, this saint was known for being a bit impetuous. He questioned Christ on things he did not understand and then, after Jesus rose from the dead, did not believe at first that He was the risen Christ, Later, he was sent to evangelize various peoples and ultimately reached India. It's believed he died accidentally from a hunter's arrow.
- 2. July 4. Not to be confused with the better-known saint by this name, this Spanish princess married the King of Portugal at age 12. She was devout, attending daily Mass, but her husband did not share her virtues and caused scandal. After a minor miracle occurred, and a page whom the king had ordered to be thrown into a furnace was saved, the King turned his life around. Meanwhile the saint showed kindness to the poor and served as a peacemaker.
- 3. July 9. This saint lived from 1865 to 1942, and was the first Brazilian citizen to be canonized. Of Italian origin, she was a religious sister who took care of sick children and seniors. She was a co-founder of

the Congregation of the Little Sisters of the Immaculate Conception. Caring for hospice patients and her fellow sisters, she herself suffered much from diabetes. Today, she is recognized as the patron saint of diabetics.

- 4. July 12. A resident of Jerusalem in Jesus' time, this saint is best known for her compassion for Jesus as He was on His way to His crucifixion. She reportedly offered Him a cloth, possible her veil, to wipe His face in the midst of His ordeal. The cloth is believed to still exist as one of the Vatican's most treasured relics.
- 5. July 16. This feast day of Blessed Mother became popular in the 18th century. It commemorates Mary in association with a site in northern Israel, looking out to the Mediterranean Sea. This is where Elijah had an altar to the one true God. A later religious order also is named for the site. The feast day celebrates Mary's practices of prayer and reflection.
- 6. July 25. This saint, who lived in Christ's time, was the brother of John the disciple. "The Greater" was added to his name, to differentiate him from an apostle with the same name who was said to be less tall. As one of Jesus' disciples, this saint was present when Jesus helped the fishermen

fill their nets and at the Transfigura helped spread the Gospel message and the Roman kingdom, later beir tyred by King Herod, the first apos

Praying With the Book of Psalms Will Bring Comfort, Pope Says

VATICAN CITY (CNS) - There is a prayer for every state of mind and spiritual need in the Book of Psalms, Pope Francis said.

"There are many Psalms that help us

forge ahead. Get into the habit of praying the Psalms. I assure you that you will be happy in the end," the Pope said during his June 19 general audience.

During his main catechesis, the Pope continued his series on the Holy Spirit and highlighted the importance of prayer,

especially in preparation for Holy Year

All the books of the Bible are inspired by the Holy Spirit, he said, "but the Book of Psalms is also so in the sense that it is full of poetic inspiration."

The Psalms were the prayer of Jesus, Mary, the Apostles and all previous Christian generations, he said. Jesus enters into the world with a verse from a psalm in his heart, "I delight to do your will, my God (Ps 40:9), and he leaves the world with another verse, "Into your hands I commend my spirit" (Ps 31:6).

"Do you pray with the Psalms

sometimes?" the Pope asked, reminding people that there are special editions that contain the New Testament and the Psalms together.

"I have on my desk a Ukrainian

edition" of the New Testament and the Psalms that belonged to a soldier who died in the war, he said. "He used to pray at the front with this book," referring to the 23-yearold soldier named Oleksandr.

"If there are Psalms, or just verses, that speak to our heart, it is good to repeat them and pray them during the day. The

Psalms are prayers 'for all seasons': There is no state of mind or need that does not find in them the best words to be transformed into prayer," the Pope said.

The Psalms also allow the faithful to expand on the nature of their prayers, he said, so prayers are not just a series of requests and a continuous "give me, give

"The Psalms help us to open ourselves to a prayer that is less focused on ourselves: a prayer of praise, of blessing, of thanksgiving; and they also help us give voice to all creation, involving it in our praise," he said.
