If you are not a St. Joseph parishioner and want to baptize your child in this parish, you need to get permission from your pastor to baptize your child here. The parents and sponsors must attend a class before the Baptism of the child.

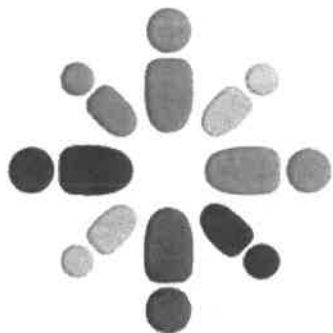

Catholic Mission Congress Focuses on Inspiring Vocations

More than 250 people from across the Diocese of Yakima attended the Church Mission Congress, October 12 at La Salle High School in the Yakima Valley. The Congress, with a theme of “Called By Name,” focused on inspiring vocations

– to the priesthood, religious life and marriage.

Keynote speakers, Bob McMorro and Leticia Ramirez, stressed the importance of creating “a culture of vocations” in our individual parishes.

“They started presenting the reality of vocations in the country,” observed Father Edgar Quiroga, coordinator for vocations committees for parishes in the Diocese of Yakima. Although vocations to the priesthood have been on a decline across

the nation, there is now a rise in interest, he said.

“In Yakima, we are stable right now but our Catholic population is growing and we will need more priests,” Father Quiroga noted. “It starts with the family. We need holy families.” It is vital that we protect the family, continue to promote Holy Matrimony and promote families, he said.

There also is an emphasis on working with youth. “We want young people to start asking themselves, ‘What does God want me to do in life?’”

The Congress kicked off a renewed effort within the Diocese to reach out to

many individuals through a variety of parish activities which could include everything from vocational retreats to holy hour taking home a chalice week to pray for vocations and a “vocational banquet” he added. Fathers La Chavez and Michael

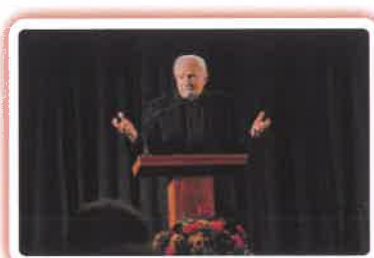
Catholic Foundation Holds Its Annual ‘Celebration of Faith’

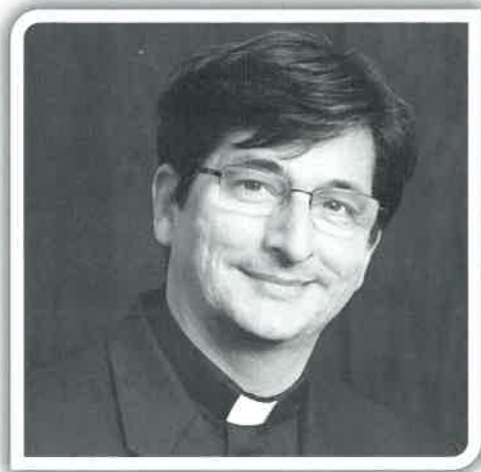

Is it God’s will for me to be a priest?

We’ve all heard the perhaps too-often-used phrase, “It takes a village to raise a child.” Well it’s even more the case that “It takes a parish to raise up a priest.”

I hope you will consider chipping in and participating in your local parish vocation committee. Right now, the priests in the parishes are discovering who their parishioners are who have engaged in our vocation committee process. How Many of The 'Saints of Autumn' Can You Name?

There are many Catholic saints whose feast days are celebrated during the Autumn season. See how many of the following you can name. Some are well known and others may be new to you. The answers follow at the end.

1. November 5. A cousin of the Virgin Mary, this saint became the mother of St. John the Baptist. Mary came to visit her at the time when she was expecting the Baby Jesus. The saint told Mary, "Blessed are you among women..." The two women spent about three months together.

2. November 10. This fifth-century saint, born to an aristocratic family in Rome, became a Pope and was named a Doctor of the Church. He was the first Pope to be called "the Great." A defender of the "orthodox teaching" and "full deposit of faith" of the Catholic Church, he wrote a letter proclaiming the official teaching that Jesus has both a human and divine nature. He inspired charitable work and gave sermons focusing on the needs and interests of his people.

3. November 15. This first-century saint was the father of St. John the Baptist. Married to St. Elizabeth, he received a vision from an angel, telling him that his wife would bear a son. He was rendered unable to speak until St. John was born. One legend says that he was killed in the temple when he would not tell King Herod where his son could be found.

4. November 22. Regarded as the

patroness of music, this saint died in the third century. She was said to hear "heavenly music in her heart" upon marriage to a man named Valerian. She, too, lived in Rome, preached and helped hundreds of people convert to the Faith. After being arrested, attempts to suffocate and decapitate her were unsuccessful, leaving her to die from her injuries days later. In the 16th century, her body was exhumed, perfectly preserved.

5. November 25. This patron saint of students and unmarried girls was born in the third century in Alexandria, Egypt. She may have been a princess. She was so intelligent that an emperor who was persecuting Christians ordered 50 philosophers and orators to debate her. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, she converted numerous among them and perhaps even the emperor's wife. This saint is believed to have been martyred. A monastery, which still exists, was built in her name.

6. December 1. A Protestant scholar of the 16th century, this saint converted to the Catholic faith and became a Jesuit priest. He had a vision of Blessed Mother, foretelling his death. This saint traveled across the English countryside on horseback, preaching to the people and converting many. He

finally died a martyr in London. Today, entities such as a hall at Seattle are named in honor of him.


7. December 6. This bishop of fourth century is credited with ins ongoing tradition of visits by Santa. With his inheritance, he did works, including giving three bags of gold to an impoverished family. He had three daughters, allegedly the gold through a window. He had a vision of Our Lord Blessed Mother, destroyed pagan temples and freed innocent prisoners. Miracles have been attributed to his intercession.

8. December 9. This Mexican saint, who died in 1548, was the Aztecs' pagan religion. It was replaced by Franciscan missionaries, who converted to Catholicism. One day, he had a vision of the Blessed Mother who asked him to build a chapel in her honor. The bishop wanted proof of his vision. He again saw Mary who told him to fill his cloak with flowers. Meeting once more, the bishop, he opened his cloak, revealing an image of Our Lady of Guadalupe.

Allamano, an Italian who lived
1 to 1926, was the nephew of St.
Cafasso and had as his spiri-
tor for four years St. John Bosco,
of the Salesians. He founded the
tstitute of Consolata Missionaries in
the women’s branch of the order
ater, as rector of Turin’s Shrine of
of Consolation, he gathered Turin

priests willing to be missionaries, forming
an institute named after the shrine.

– St. Manuel Ruiz López, six other Fran-
ciscans from Spain and one from Austria as
well as three Maronite laymen,
blood brothers – Abdel Moati,
Francis and Raphael Massabki
– were murdered in St. Paul’s
Church and convent in Damas-
cus, Syria, the night between
July 9 and 10, 1860, by Druze
militants.

Father Ruiz was superior of
the convent and, according to
the Dicastery for the Causes of
Saints, after the militants broke
in, “his first thought was to go
to the church and consume the
Eucharistic hosts to prevent
them from being profaned. He
was put to death at the foot of
the altar.”

The other Franciscan friars who were
canonized are: St. Carmelo Bolta Bañuls,
St. Engelbert Kolland, St. Nicanor Ascanio
Soria, St. Nicolás María Alberca Torres, St.
Pedro Nolasco Soler Méndez, St. Francisco
Pinazo Peñalver and St. Juan Jacob Fernán-
dez.

The Massabki brothers lived in Damas-
cus and frequently assisted the Franciscan
friars. St. Abdel Moati was married with five
children and helped out at the friars’ school.
St. Francis was a silk merchant who also was

married and was the father of eight children.
St. Raphael was single and was known to
spend long hours praying in the church.

– St. Marie-Léonie Paradis was born
Virginie-Alodie Paradis in L’Acadie, Quebec,
in 1840. The future saint entered the convent
of the Marianites of Holy Cross. Given the
religious name Marie de Sainte-Léonie, she
had various teaching assignments in Canada
before being sent to teach at St. Vincent’s
orphanage in New York.

In 1880 in Memramcook, New Bruns-
wick, she founded a new community, the In-
stitute of the Little Sisters of the Holy Family,
to support the ministry of priests. With 91
sisters, the community was approved in 1896
in Sherbrooke, Québec. The sisters’ website
describes their mission as “the spiritual and
material support of the ministry of priests.”

– Finally, St. Elena Guerra was born
in Lucca, Italy, in 1835 and was drawn to
Christian service, initially founding a school
for poor girls in her hometown. According
to the Dicastery for the Causes of Saints,
she had had “a very special devotion to the
Holy Spirit.” She founded the community
that would become the Oblates of the Holy
Spirit.

Later, “saddened to find that most
Christians neglected devotion to the Para-
clete,” the website said, she wrote a pamphlet
called “Pious Union of Prayers to the Holy
Spirit” to spread devotion to the Spirit, espe-
cially in the days leading up to Pentecost.

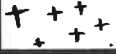

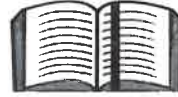
